Alternative course lengths

- Many universities offer course lengths that are less than 14-16 weeks including:
 - Half-semester courses that meet for half a regular term
 - Intersession courses that meet between regular terms
 - Weekend courses that combine in-person and remote
 - Summer courses of varying lengths
 - Study abroad programs

Advantages of alternative course lengths

- Allow students to stay on track
 - Student athletes
 - Students who are in dual degree programs
 - Students who have to repeat a course
- Could be a financial benefit
 - Market to non-matriculated students
 - Couple with study abroad opportunities

Intersessions:

An intersession is a 10-day class session that is offered before the beginning of the regular full session in the fall, spring, and summer terms. Intersession classes are available to continuing students, returning students and transfer students. Registration for an intersession is not allowed for first semester new freshmen.

Coursework during an intersession is very concentrated and intensive. It is recommended that students talk with their advisor before enrolling in an intersession course.

Schedule:

There will be three intersessions throughout the academic year: May Intersession, August Intersession, and January Intersession.

The intersession calendar includes one Saturday class in most sessions, but may include two Saturday classes in January during some years. The January intersession may also vary between 8-10 days depending on the academic calendar.

Experience the history and beauty of Rome. Please note that this course will be conducted over a short period of time and will be intensive. Be prepared to commit the same time and effort as a 16 week semester long course.

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Example of current syllabus language for inter-session course

• Special Note about this online course: This course should be a lot of fun, but it compresses all of the same material covered in a one-semester course into 12 days. Although it includes a weekend break from lectures, this design converts to an average of about 6 or so hours of work per day, and that will limit your non-course-related activities. Accordingly, it is not wise to take this course if you have any other demands on your time – including travel, weddings, internships, jobs, weekend obligations, or other such commitments -- and time does not allow for interfering events. What's more, because you have at least one item (a short essay) due every day (and on 4 of the days, two items – an essay and an exam) and your final grades will be submitted just 12 days from the start of the course, there is no time for delay or confusion. If you will be in a time zone in which an exam (since they will be administered using Central Standard Time) occurs in the middle of the night, you need to notify us now so that we can arrange an exception. If you don't understand how to submit an assignment, you need to tell us right away. And if you get special accommodations for tests, you need to provide me with a letter right away.

Dept. of Ed definitions

- CH-Q3: Does the definition of a credit hour mean that all 3-credit courses will have to meet for 3 hours per week or the equivalent of 37.5 clock hours for a semester hour?
- CH-A3: No. The credit-hour definition does not dictate particular amounts of classroom time versus out-of-class student work. Further note that the definition provides that a credit hour may be for an equivalent amount of work over a different amount of time. There is no requirement that a 3-semester hour course meet 3 hours per week during a semester or a 3-quarter-hour course meet 3 hours per week during a quarter. The requirement is that the institution determine that there is an amount of student work for a credit hour that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class and two hours of out-of-class student work per week over a semester for a semester hour or a quarter for a quarter hour.

 CH-Q4: How would an institution apply the definition of a credit hour if the institution offers asynchronous online courses that are not also offered in a classroom setting?

• CH-A4: There is no "seat time" requirement implicit in the definition of a credit hour. An institution that is offering asynchronous online courses would need to determine the amount of student work expected in each online course in order to achieve the course objectives, and to assign a credit hour based on at least an equivalent amount of work as represented in the definition of credit hour.
